GENERAL NOTES: Maturity refers to the number of weeks a plant will take to mature from seed. Take away approximately four weeks from this figure if you are planting seedlings. Where only the seed symbol is given it means that the plant does not transplant easily and is best sown direct. [^] Cabbage, Broccoli and Cauliflower can be planted in spring for summer cropping but will be subject to attacks by cabbage butterfly caterpillars. For this reason such plantings should only be done by experienced gardeners using varieties specifically bred to handle summer conditions.

[#] Does not transplant easily. If growing seedlings to transplant grow them in single pots to minimize root disturbance when transplanted.

[♦] Lettuces planted to mature over the summer months should be planted in semi shaded positions.
